

ABOUT "CHRIST IN THE STRANGEST PLACES"



that I may keep your precepts.


Make your face shine upon your servant,

Readings

Old Testament Reading: Judges 6:7-16; 7:19-22

When the Israelites cried to the LORD because of Midian, he sent them a prophet, who said, "This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: I brought you up out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. I snatched you from the power of Egypt and from the hand of all your oppressors. I drove them from before you and gave you their land. I said to you, 'I am the LORD your God; do not worship the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you live.' But you have not listened to me."

The angel of the LORD came and sat down under the oak in Ophrah that belonged to Joash the Abiezrite, where his son Gideon was threshing wheat in a winepress to keep it from the Midianites. When the angel of the LORD appeared to Gideon, he said, "The LORD is with you, mighty warrior." "But sir," Gideon replied, "if the LORD is with us, why has all this happened to us? Where are all his wonders that our fathers told us about when they said, 'Did not the LORD bring us up out of Egypt?' But now the LORD has abandoned us and put us into the hand of Midian." The LORD turned to him and said, "Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. Am I not sending you?" "But Lord," Gideon asked, "how can I save Israel? My clan is the weakest in Manasseh, and I am the least in my family." The LORD answered, "I will be with you, and you will strike down all the Midianites together."

Gideon and the hundred men with him reached the edge of the camp at the beginning of the middle watch, just after they had changed the guard. They blew their trumpets and broke the jars that were in their hands. The three companies blew the trumpets and smashed the jars. Grasping the torches in their left hands and holding in their right hands the trumpets they were to blow, they shouted, "A sword for the LORD and for Gideon!" While each man held his position around the camp, all the Midianites ran, crying out as they fled. When the three hundred trumpets sounded, the LORD caused the men throughout the camp to turn on each other with their swords. The army fled to Beth Shittah toward Zererah as far as the border of Abel Meholah near Tabbath.

Epistle Reading: Galatians 5:16-25


So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature. For the sinful nature desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the sinful nature. They are in conflict with each other, so that you do not do what you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under law. The acts of the sinful nature are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the sinful nature with its passions and desires.

Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit.

Holy Gospel: Luke 11:33-36


"No one lights a lamp and puts it in a place where it will be hidden, or under a bowl. Instead he puts it on its stand, so that those who come in may see the light. Your eye is the lamp of your body. When your eyes are good, your whole body also is full of light. But when they are bad, your body also is full of darkness. See to it, then, that the light within you is not darkness. Therefore, if your whole body is full of light, and no part of it dark, it will be completely lighted, as when the light of a lamp shines on you."

C: We know by bitter experience that the world is no friend to bring us closer to you. It continually beckons us with its lustful pleasures, its earthly treasures, and its many false gods.


P: Through the Holy Spirit strengthen our love for Christ, so that the world will not be able to gain control of our hearts and fill us with love for material and sinful things.

The Promise of Baptism

He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned (Mark 16:16)

"He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Now you may want to say: I seem to hear, then, that Baptism is also a part of faith. Of course, it is; but Baptism is not a work that we accomplish. It must be associated with faith because God desires that faith should not remain hidden in the heart but rather break out into the open so that it may be recognized and become manifest before the world.

Therefore, He has ordained these outward signs so that everyone can make known and confess his faith, in order that there may be opportunity also to take up the holy cross. For if faith were to remain buried secretly in the heart, people would be quite safe and no obliged to bear the cross or to follow after Christ. For if the worker did not know that we believe, we would not be persecuted.

Second, no one would be helped by us and be brought to faith if we did not openly confess the Gospel and if we had no outward sign by which people could tell who and where Christians are. But now God has decreed that our faith should be manifest before the unbelievers; therefore, anyone who is now a Christian and has had himself baptized stands in danger that the unbelievers and the non-Christians may lay hold of him and kill him. Therefore, it is necessary that we be baptized, if we are Christian; or if we should not be able to achieve it, we should at least say, I would like to be baptized.

Moreover, the sign has also been given us for this reason that God Himself wants to help us, and that we should be assured of His grace, and that each person should be able to say: God has given me a special token that I may be certain I am saved, as He has promised me through the Gospel. For He has given us the Gospel, which is the charter; and beside the Gospel He has given us Baptism, which is the seal. Thus faith, which lays hold of the Gospel, is fortified by this special token and seal. (Alone with God: Devotions from Martin Luther; CPH, 1962.)
